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VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends.

The 2006 GIFT DAY looms large on our June Calendar, and I hope very much that it will be a success not only in helping us to meet our financial commitments, but also in drawing all of us together in having a wonderful time! Details of the Gift Day programme are on the opposite page. I'd also like to draw your attention to two major liturgical events this month; Corpus Christi will provide us with a great prelude to the Gift Day events, with the High Mass, Procession of the Host and Benediction at 7pm on Thursday June 16th. If it is at the heart of our faith to recognize Jesus in the Sacrament of the Altar, so we must also see him in our neighbour, in the community which comes together for the fun and hard work of Gift Day, and particularly in those, wherever they may be and however we encounter them, who are vulnerable and needy. Then on Thursday June 29th we celebrate the Feast of our 'older' Patron, St Peter. There is the possibility of some special music on this occasion, but this is yet to be arranged.

On matters of 'bricks and mortar', we have now received the Faculty for the replacement of the very ancient heating pipes and radiators, which have been giving trouble for some years. This major work, to be paid for out of the Vicar and Churchwardens' Fund, will, we hope, be carried out between mid-July and the end of August. More of a distant vision is the idea of once again extending the Parish Room, this time on its south side, to make an additional room which could also open up into the existing space. As many of you are aware, we often suffer from overcrowding when people gather after Sunday High Mass or on special occasions; and there are many occasions when we could also do with an additional room in which a small group would be able to meet. Our architect has prepared a drawing offering a very simple suggestion for this kind of extension, and a copy will be displayed in the Parish Room for comments and suggestions. I probably don't need to emphasize that this would be a slow and complex process, if it gets under way at all; but perhaps we should rejoice at the fact that lack of space is a problem!

Improvements in LSM are not all about heating pipes and architects' drawings; I'm very grateful to the people who look after our vestments and altar linen; there's a team of people under the general supervision of Mark Caddick who wash the linen (and there's Hazel Pritchett Harris who washes armfuls of Cottas!): there are people like Jill Biddle and Jo McGrade who repair vestments and falls... and now these two are about to undertake the restoration and improvement of one of the sets of gold High Mass vestments. We have also ordered new green falls for the pulpit and lectern, the old ones being very worn, and a matching fall for the legilium; we hope that the cost of these will be covered by a grant from the strangely named 'Number 1 Trust' which supports churches of Catholic tradition!

On page 4 you will find a piece about the comings and goings of Lay Pastoral Assistants and Ordinands, currently a major part of LSM life!

LAY PASTORAL ASSISTANTS & ORDINANDS

CONGRATULATIONS to Amy Mcrriman, who has been appointed to the post of Chaplaincy Assistant at Bishop Grossteste College, Lincoln. Her nine months with us will be over at the end of June, and the present plan is that July 2nd (when we keep the Feast of the Visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary to Elizabeth) will be her last Sunday with us; however, we are currently looking into the possibility of her being able to stay for a further month. Her replacement, from the beginning of October, will be Gemma Burnet-Chetwynd. From Northern Ireland, Gemma read theology at Corpus Christi College here in Cambridge, where she was confirmed; she then did an MPhil, supervised by Fr Ben Quash. Now married to Paul, a PhD student, she has been assisting on Sundays in Fulbourn Parish over the last few months. We are hoping that she and Paul will be able to have one of the flats for married couples at Wesley House, where both Amy and Alex Faludy have had rooms while working with us at LSM; but this is not yet settled.

We have been fortunate time and again in the quality of ordinands who have been on attachment at LSM from Westcott House and Ridley Hall; Paul Redparth is someone who has been particularly generous in the time he has given to us. Among much else, he played an important part in the planning of the Lent Courses both this year and last, and we look forward to his swansong when he plays the part of Counsel for the Plaintiff in "Irial by Jury"! He will be ordained deacon in Chichester Cathedral on July 1st, to serve in the parish of All Saints, Ruffey, near Horsham. Paul West, from the Diocese of Wangaratta in Australia, has been denied as much time as he would have liked at LSM by the need to experience other manifestations of the C.of E., but we are delighted that his Bishop's suggestion that he be ordained deacon in LSM has been approved; this means that many of the friends he has made while in Cambridge will be able to attend his ordination, which will be on St Benedict's Day, Tuesday July 11th, at 7.30pm. Ilis Bishop will be in the UK at this time, on subbatical leave. Natasha Woodward is another Westcott ordinand who has been worshipping with us this year, and who, like her husband Stephen, has been an altar server here for some months. She will be ordained deacon to serve in the parish St Paulinus, Crayford in the Rochester Diocese on Saturday September 9th at 3pm. Liz Adekunle, in her first year at Ridley Hall, has been a lively presence among us, and we hope that we may see something of her next academic year too. Among those to be priested this year, we shall especially remember John Hughes, in Exeter Diocese, and Matt Bullimore in Wakefield Diocese. Matt is to be married in Emmanuel College Chapel on August 12th. Many of you will also remember Fr Robert Mackley; he will be moving in June from his first curacy at Clerkenwell, to be Assistant Priest at Liverpool Parish Church.

Finally, for the month of July, and joining us on July 2nd, we shall have with us on placement (which is a more full-time commitment than an attachment) **Anthony Hammill**, another ordinand from Ridley Hall. A good way for someone in this

position to get to know more about LSM and its people is through being invited to meals in the homes of members of the congregation. So do please let me know if you might be able to offer Anthony hospitality during July.

To all at Little St. Mary's - from Anthony Hammill, see above...

I will be joining you during July for a placement and thought you might like to know something about me before I arrive. I am training for the ordained ministry at Ridley Ilall. I am married to Judi, and we live in Cambridge near to the railway station. This is good news for Judi who is head teacher of a Church of England primary school on Brick Lane in London. Until 2004 I also worked in London as a civil servant, first at the Department of the Environment and more recently at IIM Treasury. I then spent a year studying theology at King's College London before coming to Ridley. We moved here from Sevenoaks, in Rochester diocese, but do not have much claim to be from Kent: I grew up in Newcastle and Judi in Peru. Since coming to Cambridge we have been attending Christ the Redeemer, East Barnwell. I am looking forward to worshipping with you at Little St. Mary's during July and being part of your parish life.

THE CHURCH URBAN FUND, CHALLENGING POVERTY

The Church Urban Fund (CUF) is a charity that resources grassroots activity in the poorest parts of England. Working in partnership with faith organisations at the local level, it supports people who are making a difference where they live. They aim to:

- Empower local projects to enable them to address issues of poverty.
- Fund faith-based social action projects.
- Work at a grassroots level.
- Be a voice for faith communities.
- Influence regeneration policy both nationally and locally.
- Act as a signpost to helpful resources.
- Help projects think clearly about their aims and objectives.
- Help projects to think about the long-term impact of their work.
 Encourage the Church to better understand and serve people living in poverty.

Theywork in the top 10 of the poorest communities in England and use the Church of England's diocesan structure to ensure local knowledge informs support. It also enables good regional coverage and there are support projects in both urban and rural areas.

The support does not end with the projects CUF acts as a conduit for Christian action. In a society where the Church's role is often deemed to be of marginal worth, it sees the Church as being at the heart of the community. 

ANGLO-AMERICAN FAIR, The Guildhall 1958

Opened by Mrs John Hay Whitney, wife of the American Ambassador

The Church has recently received papers with the details of an Anglo American Fair held in 1958, using the Washington Memorial as its centrepiece. These were donated by the Revd Tony Hart, then an Ordinand at Corpus Christi College. During his time in Cambridge, he had the idea of using the Memorial to raise money for the Church Restoration Fund. The congregation of the most beautiful small church in the world needed to find £7,500 (approx. £100,00 in today's money). The archive consists of all correspondence relating to the organisation of the Fair, the appeal publications and the programme and tickets for the day. The Fair attracted much positive publicity in the local press as a Bright and Go Ahead Event!

In Tony Hart's own words, 'the Memorial tablet has recently seen a new resplendence come over its surroundings for the church is being completely restored and the whole building is beginning to look worthy of the great tradition of beautiful and dignified worship and witness to the glory of the Christian heritage for which it is justly famed."

Tony Hart, together with other undergraduate members of the congregation, hit upon 'celebrating the church's American connection by inviting local civil ians and service folk to join them in a day of Americana with stalls and side shows from both sides of the Atlantic. In the evening, there must be an original kind of soiree, with a hamburger bar and refreshments and a transatlan tic exchange of entertainment - given the Italian name of a Farrago."

What gave the event greatest momentum was the idea of inviting the wife of the distinguished American Ambassador, Mr John Hay Whitney, to open the Fair. This made it possible to issue an invitation to the USAF station at Wethersfield under Major Furley E Peebles to provide a guard of honour to receive her at the Guildhall. It also boosted the fundraising effort as Mrs Whitney was known to the Royal Family. The Queen wrote congratulating the organisers, the Queen Mother sent a case of dessert knives and forks and Princess Margaret gave a 'delightful tea service', all to be sold at the Fair.

Elaborate arrangements were made with detailed instructions to all helpers set ting up stalls at the Guildhall ready for opening. At 1210pm, Mrs Whitney arrived at the church to be received by the Bishop, the Rt Revd Noel Baring Hudson, and the Vicar, Canon Maycock. She was then shown the restoration work and

the Washington Memorial before proceeding to a reception at the Guildhall. There, she was received by the Mayor and Mayoress, Councillor and Mrs B.J. White, and the High Sheriff, Mr E.G. Gordon Frost, Lunch was laid on at Christ's College where the Vice Master was Dr AT. Peck, a name well known to members of the LSM congregation.

According to a press account, 'she was wearing an extremely smart and distinctive red suit, trimmed with red velvet and a velvet hat to match'. In her speech opening the Fair, Mrs Whitney said that 'my husband owes his allegiance to Oxford, but I am all for Cambridge' Speaking of LSM, she said that the Washing ton Memorial has a special significance for Americans and established one more bond between the two nations. The Bishop of Ely, who was in the Chair, spoke of the wonderful generosity, hospitality and friendship of the Americans. 'Small wonder is that I like an opportunity to be associated with our American friends.' In proposing a vote of thanks to Mrs Whitney, the Mayor said, 'We have a great regard for the Americans. Since the war, we have welcomed thousands of your American countrymen and at the American Cemetery at Madingley, we have a reminder of the debt that we owe to your country.' The High Sheriff' spoke of the work of the President of the United States (Dwight D. Eisenhower) 'who was doing his part to make the world a better place in which to live.'

During her tour of the Fair, Mrs Whitney took part in all the competitions and even had her photograph taken—or rather of her face which had been superimposed on a drawing of a bathing beauty. Canon Maycock joined her in the photograph, having his head taken above the sketch of a muscle man. She also bought something at each stall that she visited.

The evening Farrago began at 830PM with a reception and refreshments. There were floor shows by the Footlights' and from the 'Broadway Revue' consisting of various groups from the USAF stations. A contemporary press cutting said, "We watched Captain Jordan introduce the Revue, Sgt. Leroy Rose from Corpus Christi, Texas, was caller for the Buttons and Bows, a square dance group from Alconbury, followed by the Rainbows Rhythm and Blues group, all negro. Ed Masters from Cleveland, Ohio, played his accordian and then I losea Hornbuckle from Detroit, Mich, led the Playboys quintet in singing a song called 'sexy ways' Certainly, this was nothing in the usual run of church fetes." As a fundraiser, the Fair was a great success, raising £455143 net (about £6 to £7,000 in today's money).

BEFRIENDING

Befriending is a much needed and much valued means of helping people. Much goes on, of course, in an informal way amongst friends and neighbours, but many charities run befriending schemes in which people commit themselves to spending an hour or two a week with someone in need of this kind of help. Well run charities will provide training and support, and arrange for the criminal record checks which are necessary for people doing this kind of work.

Charities running befriending schemes in Cambridge include Cam Mind (C31320) and Friends of Fulbourn Hospital (C, 88067) who help people with mental health problems. Help the Aged runs schemes for visiting the elderly (contact John Walker on C,306002) and also has a special scheme directed at young people wanting to visit called CONTACT. John Walker can provide more details.
