

VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

Alongside the reports from sub-committees and working groups, the **PCC** now has one main or special item for discussion on the agenda at each meeting. In September (when the meeting is on Thursday 7th) it will be the Pastoral Plan for the South Cambridge Area, which encourages informal partnerships between various churches: please talk to PCC members, who all have copies of the plan, about this. In July, it was our Mission Statement for 2006-7; we had a good discussion on this, and it was agreed that this should read as follows:

The foundation and heart of our Mission as the People of God is our Eucharistic and Sacramental life, in which we are built up as a community in Jesus Christ, seeking to worship God in the beauty of holiness, and to serve Him in daily life.

The PCC also agreed a number of particular objectives for 2006-7:

· Worship

To increase attendance at services, particularly Sunday High Mass

· The life of Prayer

To inaugurate monthly Compline and maintain a monthly meditation

Teaching

To run an autumn course on 'Illuminating the Mass'
To explore the possibility of a Lent course to be shared with other local churches on the 'Use of the Bible today'

Young people

To develop opportunities with young people in the life of our church

· Music

To plan a programme of recitals following the installation of the new Organ. To complete the review of the Parish Choir.

Ministry to Visitors

To improve communication and welcome material.

To have the Church history translated into other languages

· Outside Concerns

To continue support for local groups and our overseas church links, and to develop the work of the Social Responsibility Group

Administration and Management

To monitor housekeeping in our premises, including the garden

I hope very much that this list of objectives will help us all in our prayers and in our involvement in the life of the parish. On our long-term agenda is the possibility of a further extension of the Parish Room, which is bound to involve much imaginative and careful thought; at the moment we are considering the possibility of informal consultation with other architects.

Small amounts of money keep trickling in to boost the **Gift Day** takings; at the July PCC meeting, the Treasurer reported a net figure of £7,300.72, a very substantial increase on the 2005 figure of £5,471.92, largely accounted for by increased Gift Aid donations, and by the takings for 'Trial by Jury'. I would like to repeat and underline the thanks which I expressed in the July Newsletter to everyone involved not least those who laboured all day long on the stalls and in the kitchen!

These summer months are being overshadowed by the disquieting developments in the Middle East...and for us Anglicans and members of the Church of England by the divisions over the Ordination of Women to the Episcopate and over issues of sexuality. The roots of the Middle East's problems go back centuries, as we discover as we read the Old Testament stories of the relationship of the people of Israel with their neighbours; and one of the issues for some of the opponents of the proposed developments in our Church is that they will mean changes in positions which most Christians have held for hundreds of years. Clearly reflections on the significance of *time* in such matters as these are only a small part of the total story; I mention them only as a reminder both of some of the realities faced by the world and the churches, and of the need to be patient and persevering in *prayer*...not least for those in positions of responsibility. I need hardly say that we must also hold in our prayers the innocent people on both sides of the Israeli-Lebanon border, and in Gaza, who are suffering so much at the moment.

The disputes and conflicts which affect so many people, institutions and countries might well lead us to cynicism and even despair about the human condition. The celebration of the **Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary**, which we keep as our Patronal Festival, on Tuesday August 15th, is one which reminds us of the potential of every human being, created in the image of God and *capax Dei*... capable of being filled with all the fullness of God, as Mary was. I look forward

to seeing you all at the High Mass that evening, and at our Assumptiontide Barbecue (in aid of the Papua New Guinea Church Partnership) on Saturday August 19th at 7.30pm.

PEOPLE FOR OUR PRAYERS

R.I.P

After a long illness, **Marguerite South** died in hospital on July 21°, 5 days after her 97th birthday, celebrated in hospital with a few friends. She had received Holy Communion a week before her death. Her association with Little St Mary's was established mainly through her membership of the Friends of LSM, but she appreciated our church's liturgy and sacramental life. Her earlier family associations were with St Andrew's Chesterton, where her ashes will be interred. She requested a Sung Requiem at LSM before her cremation. A teacher, she finished her career as Headmistress of the famous Dame Allan's School in Newcastle; many former pupils kept in touch with her during her long retirement in Cambridge. Until a few years ago, she was still teaching a Greek Adult Education course, and kept up her reading and wide interests in people and events until the end. May she rest in peace and rise in glory.

Sheila Duffy (an occasional worshipper at LSM following her move to Trumpington, and a member of the Friends) was taken into Addenbrookes on July 20th following a stroke. Her speech and her right arm have been affected, but she is making steady progress.

AMY'S ADIEU

Ten months as Pastoral Assistant in LSM have given me much food for thought - and there's an understatement if ever I made one: I think I need a month on retreat to process everything! I came dealing with vocational issues — as well as numerous questions about the Church — but had decided that it was more important for me to do the job for its own sake. It has been a fruitful experience from that perspective, even without looking any further. Some of my questions have been answered, but most only partially... and I am usually coming up with more!

Rather bizarrely, given a relative absence of the 'traditional' aspects of parish ministry (e.g. Occasional Offices), LSM has many features that make it a helpful place to explore Christian vocation in its widest possible sense: the pattern of prayer, the daily mass, an inspiring Vicar, a wealth of social activities, loads of ordinands hanging around... I think the most valuable aspect of this job has been the permission to glimpse a vision of Christian ministry: through participation in all aspects of worship, through watching extremely closely, and through being allowed to do that close watching in some amazing – and hard – situations. However, it has also been good to learn 'on the job': not least being thrown in the deep end with (increasingly) short notice. Extremely terrifying, but also exciting – and, no doubt, experience beyond price!

Priceless is also the way I am tempted to describe working with Fr Andrew...! It has been a privilege, and his wise guidance combined with an ability to tolerate gloomy, not to say grumpy, questions first thing on a Monday morning have been very much appreciated.

I suspect that the place where I have unconsciously gained most insight has been through watching how the Eucharist is celebrated, and celebrated day after day. Through serving at Benediction, through the way the Office is said, through the Ministry of Healing, I have glimpsed, a very little more, the place – and cost – of intercession. Beyond the worship, I have found the ministry of hospitality, located in the Parish Room by the indefatigable Social Committee, inspiring. And beyond the immediate congregation, but nonetheless an important part of this community, the 12 o'clock group on a Monday has particularly touched, challenged and, I hope, changed me.

The post is a challenging one, physically as well as spiritually and emotionally; I think I found the first months, with their run up to Christmas, not particularly easy. That being said, it has been beyond doubt an enjoyable as well as informative ten months. I am deeply grateful to all those who have offered friendship and made supportive noises, to all those who have taught me in various capacities — and to any who offered me hospitality! I hope that Gemma, my successor, will experience a similar warmth, support and hospitality: I am sure that she will be a positive and exciting addition to LSM from the autumn.
