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VICAR''S LETTER Dear Friends,

If a ving just returned from my two weeks away on holiday and at the Diocesan Clergy Conference, and with responsibilities at a 'Retreat in Daily Life' in Ely in the first week of October, I am particularly conscious of the help which we receive at LSM from College and other clergy; this enables us to keep the Daily Mass going, as well as the evening Sung Mass on weekday festivals and High Mass on Sundays. My reckoning is that 8 priests, in addition to Fr Mark and myself, have assisted here liturgically over the summer months. I would like to thank all these priests, but particularly this month the Dean of King's, Fr Ian Thompson, who for several years has acted in a semi-official capacity as Honorary Assistant Priest at LSM.; in the light of his heavy and ever-increasing responsibilities at King's, we have agreed that this formal link with LSM should come to an end at the beginning of this Michaelmas Term. He assures me that I may still call upon him from time to time, at least in vacations!

The availability of help from elergy here in Cambridge and their willingness to give it is a factor in any consideration of the Pastoral Plan for the South Cambridge Area; at least in a church such as LSM with its emphasis on the sacraments, it is reassuring to know that college elergy and others are glad to be part of our life. On the other hand, this is not the same as having a priest who is the persona for a particular parish. This is why, as I understand it, the Pastoral Plan proposes the retention of the current parsonage houses, so that a priest responsible for each parish and sympathetic to its tradition may be housed in the appropriate house, even if not a full-time stipendiary (but perhaps half-time, as at St Mary Magdalen's in Oxford, or NSM, or 'house-for-duty'). It is also important to realise that the proposals in the plan for 'partnerships' (as opposed to formal 'groupings') are not first and foremost about 'taking each other's services', since the particular parish's priest would be responsible for its services, but about looking for other possible areas for collaboration, for exampled in work with children and young people, in support of mental health services or community outreach. The plan is to be discussed at the Area Synod Meeting on October 12th, and before that, the Deanery Pastoral Committee will have considered representations from PCCs, including our own. One further point...in our Anglican concerns about these matters, we should not forget the coumenical perspective; this is being written a day or two before our 'Forum' with people from Emmanuel United Reformed Church, at which we may hear of new ideas from their Minister!

Some of you will have met our new Lay Pastoral Assistant, Gemma Burnett-Chetwynd, by the time you read this; she and her husband Peter are following our last two 'LPAs' in living at Wesley House where we hope that they will be very happy over the coming year. Gemma is happy to cycle moderate distances to visit people! We also have with us on a placement until Christmas a Reader in Training, Tony Bevens, from the very different setting of Great Gransden...do make yourselves known to him. He is a retired teacher. I haven't yet heard from Ridley Hall or Westcott House about our having ordinands on attachment this year; but we have had a number of 'new' people at Mass in the last week or two...please remember that it can't always be left to the Vicar to find out who they are and to help them to feel at home with us!

Looking at the activities for the coming week on Sunday September 24th I was slightly perturbed to see how much would be going on...LSM/Forum meeting on the Tuesday evening: then on Wednesday evening three things...Overseas Churches Link Group, Young People's Group planning and reflection meeting, gathering arranged by the Social Responsibility Group at Julia Wheatcroft's house to hear about her work with the Cambridge Down's Syndrome Group: on the Thursday evening the Music Fund Group, and on Friday, in addition to 'Tiny' and Junior Choir, High Mass for Michaelmas, a welcome to Gemma, and an Organ Fund meeting. Two thoughts: firstly, it's good that the daily worship with its times of stillness carries on in the midst of all this, to keep us turned towards God...secondly, it's wonderful that we have so many people prepared to be involved in different ways, giving their time and skills and enthusiasm (which takes us back to the Pastoral Plan and a recognition that the Church's ministry is not just the priest's ministry!

This month we look forward to the visit of Dan and Pam Caldwell on October 18th, St Luke's Day (more about that in Clive Brown's piece on a later page); at the 10am and 7pm Mass we shall be combining our focus on USPG's work in Peru with an expression of the Church's healing ministry. Surely both mission and the ministry of healing would have been close to the heart of St Luke. At the end of that week comes our visit to St Albans and Flamstead...have you signed up yet for the coach? (only £10, and St Albans is a fine city and Flamstead has a lovely church!). Then we shall be preparing ourselves for All Saintstide, our Dedication Festival (November 5th) and Graham Ward's Michael Ramsey Lecture on 'Political Discipleship' (November 6th)!



NOTE ON THE BARNARD SCRAPBOOKS

Amongst the LSM archives in Peterhouse Library we are fortunate to have two leather bound scrapbooks compiled by Dr EAB Barnard, the real gems being a a series of fine articles written by him on personalities associated with LSM and Peterhouse in the past and on architectural features of the church. These were written for the Parish Newsletters between 1926-42. There are also relevant letters, service sheets, sketches and brass rubbings. With the assistance of James Yardley, I have recently done some research on Dr Barnard.

Etwell Augustine Bracher Barnard was a scholar, an antiquarian and an historian of high repute noted, in particular, for a large number of carefully researched works on Worcestershire churches and on local history. He was born and spent his early life in Evesham, but moved to Cambridge after his marriage living at 26, Warkworth Street from 1923 until the end of his life. In 1951, two years before his death, he was awarded the Freedom of the City of Evesham, in recognition "of his long service to the Borough as its foremost historian".

Cambridge provided far greater scope for his talents. Attached to St Catherine's College, he became Keeper of the College Records. His work on historical records in Cambridge was of considerable importance and in recognition of this he was awarded an Honorary MA in 1935. He also played an important part in the Diocese of Ely. He was a member of the Bishop's Advisory Committee on the Care of Churches and in 1942 was appointed by the Bishop as Keeper of the Episcopal Records at Ely.

The Cambridgeshire Collection has the following note in its records written by the Bishop of Ely and taken from the Little St Mary's Parish Newsletter for March/April 1953 following EAB Barnard's death.

'Mr Barnard came to Cambridge some years ago from Evesham and soon gained a reputation as an antiquarian. During the war, he acted as Secretary to my Advisory Committee for the Care of Churches... shortly afterwards, I appointed him Diocesan Archivist and asked him to give general oversight to the large collection of documents in the Diocesan Registry in Ely. He supervised the transfer of the documents to the University Library for safety during the war, and their return later to Ely. He examined the extensive York Library at the Palace, the most important books of which have now been deposited in the University Library. He was a friend and advisor to the many scholars from all over the country and beyond who came to Ely to consult the documents. He was a learned antiquarian, with knowledge in unusual directions, and it was a great happiness to him when some years ago, the University gave him the Honorary Degree of Master of Arts. He was a devoted churchman and a regular attendant at Little St Mary's.'

OLDAGE

Like the rest of life, old age is complicated. It can be tranquil and fruitful. On the other hand, there are problems, one being poverty, which prevents many old people from doing what they would like to do or forces them to live meagre, lonely lives. For most people, sooner or later, there will be times of weakness, exhaustion, pain, frustration and sadness. Some are able to keep their independence and enjoyment of life for a long time, occupying themselves with activities, physical, artistic or intellectual; for them longevity can be a celebration. Others become feeble in body or mind at quite an early age, needing to be looked after by other people. Is there anything to celebrate in this condition?

In my eighties, as was my husband who died recently in a nursing home because I was too feeble to look after him properly at home, for a year I spent most days sitting with him so that we could be together. I could see from his room the day room, where elderly heads webbled or drooped as their owners dozed in plastic chairs, tolerating or singing along with Gracie Fields or Vera Lynne endlessly crooning songs like It's a long way to Tipperary or It's a lovely day tomorrow. The golden oldic sounds, intended to soothe, were regularly broken by shouts of "Tielp!" or loud table bangings. I soon realised that little more could be done for these large, decaying infants. At least the room was bright and clean, the old women comforted by hugging cuddly toys. The nurses and carers, mostly from distant places such as the Philippines and India, were sweet-natured and smiling. They welcomed the visitors who wavered in and out, staying for a while, trying to reach their loved ones through veils of dementia.

Visitors and nurses alike maintained a façade of cheerfulness, at least in public. My private anger was shamed by the trusting goodness of Maggie, in her nineties, who, with a heart attack behind her, sat every day, comforting those around her, holding their hands if she could reach them. When I told her how much I admired her kindness and cheerfulness, she pointed upwards, smiling. "Well, we've got to do what we can. It's not too much, but there's Someone keeping an eye on us, isn't there?"

Cause for celebration? Very much so—but hidden. In the midst of all this misery and despair the Brightness of God's Love can be found, in and around and amongst the nurses and carers and old, debilitated people. Finally, there is the Sacramental Presence of Our Lord Jesus Christ, brought by Priests to communicant members in Holy Communion, Penance and Absolution, and Holy Unction (Blessing with Oil). All we have to do, provided that we are not demented or in desperate pain, is to watch and pray and we cannot miss the Shining Light. But if even this is too much, then we depend on others to watch and pray for us. These Blessings and the opportunities of old age, the extra years some of us are granted in this beautiful, God-createxd world, are worthy of celebration and gratitude to God.
