#### VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

For the first time in my 12 years and 3 months as Vicar of LSM, or at least during the 'heating season', someone said to me the other day that they were 'rather warm' as they sat near a radiator on a Sunday morning. We have to make allowances for the fact that we are still getting used to the comparatively sophisticated valves on the new radiators (please don't tamper with the settings!), and that we were in the midst of a very pleasant spell of autumn weather; even so, the early mornings had been a little chillier, so it was encouraging to hear this comment after our major expenditure (from the Vicar and Churchwardens' Fund, with particular gratitude for a large legacy from Edith Butcher's estate) on the new radiators and pipes. I very much hope that we shall continue to hear positive comments when the weather does turn colder.

BUT...I have to say that our Treasurer told us at a recent meeting of the Finance and Standing Committee that the very small increase in *regular* giving so far this year does *not* match increases in expenditure on gas and electricity. We are all aware from our own homes of the higher prices being charged for these utilities; but what the Treasurer reports does remind us of the continuing difficulties we have in covering the *day-to-day running costs* of a building and a parish such as this (insurance and wages as well as heat and light). This year, some of you may remember, on the advice of a subcommittee of the PCC, we are NOT having a review of our Stewardship in Advent, but are waiting until late January 2007; the Treasurer will be saying something about this in the December Newsletter, but in the meantime this does alert us to our responsibility for meeting *regular* commitments as well as enjoying the benefits of the generosity of individual benefactors.

Speaking of regular commitment leads me to the well-known area of establishing a simple and realistic 'rule of life' to help us in our Christian discipleship. Changes in 'life-style' seem to be threatening the expectation of participation in worship every Sunday; this does raise real problems for the building of Christian community and for teaching ministry (and not only the formation and nurture of children and young people in the faith). I have yet to be convinced that 'going to Church when I feel like it' is the proper way for the disciple; after all responsibilities are to one another, to our 'upbuilding in love', as well as to the feeding of the instinct for worship of Almighty God. I hope very much that as we approach the end of another Church Year (concluding with the Feast of Christ the King on November 26th), we might

look back and reflect on the pattern of our Sunday worship...and then look forward, perhaps seeking the advice of a priest or other Christian, to consider what our future pattern might be. As I've said many times before, we are very fortunate here to have the rhythm of the Daily Offices and Mass, the festivals marked with a Sung Mass, opportunity on Saturday evenings for a simple preparation for Sunday worship. When we worship with others it is only a part of a 'rule of life'; what we give of time and resources is just as important, and so is our personal response to God's gift, as one of the Collects puts it, of 'an hearty desire to pray' ... and to the awraeness that 'the Spirit comes to the aid of our weakness'!

This November certainly offers us a varied programme for your regular Sunday and weekday interest and commitment! On another page, you'll find a short reminder of the riches of the season of All Saintstide, our Dedication Festival and Remembrance. As an experiment this year, we are having a 'Bring-and-Share' Lunch on Dedication Festival Sunday, November 5th. The following Sunday (Remembrance) brings us a Bring-and-Buy Sale after High Mass, and a performance of Fauré's Requiem by our Choirs at 4.30pm. On November 19th, after Evensong and Benediction Liz Adekunle from Ridley Hall will be reflecting about her recent placement in South Africa, and on the Feast of Christ the King, November 26th, after we have heard the General Secretary of the Additional Curates' Society, Fr Stephen Leach, preach in the morning\* (the Society has been giving us an annual grant of £2,000 towards our Lay Pastoral Assistant post)), there is a special ecumenical service in LSM at 3pm. As for weekdays, we look forward to a stimulating Michael Ramsey Lecture from Fr Graham Ward on Monday November 6th at 5.15pm, and to our course on 'Illuminating the Mass' which begins on Wednesday November 8th with Bring-and-Share Supper at 7pm, and continues on the following four Wednesdays. Compline will be sung on Friday November 3rd at 9pm, and the monthly **Meditation** in the Crypt will be introduced by Fr Malcolm Guite on Monday November 20th at 1pm. Fr Malcolm is an expert on the metaphysical poets, and may well be using poetry as the basis of his meditation. \* and candles for sale! (see pg 13)

Towards the end of the month, tickets will be available for our Advent Lunch (December 3<sup>rd</sup>), and I hope that many of you will be able to participate in the Quiet Weekend for Advent with Br Reginald SSF (from the evening of Friday 8th until lunchtime on Sunday 10th December); look out for full details nearer the time.

# FRIDAY LUNCH CHARITY, NOVEMBER & DECEMBER: THE LEPROSY MISSION

Today more than 1,000 people will find out that they have leprosy. Poverty and leprosy go together. The leprosy Mission team in Dhaka works in the slums to locate new cases and cure them, before they slip even deeper into poverty and all hope for their family is lost. Poverty especially traps women and children. Junisha is a young woman, just 25 years old, in great pain, her body bent and disabled. She married young, like most of the girls, and already has four children. Her husband abandoned her, and now they live in a tiny bamboo and corrugated iron room, teetering on stilts above the dirt in the slums. She finds it difficult even to beg on the streets and she has leprosy.

The effects of leprosy are devastating. Recently, Chris, a physiotherapist, has been working in the Democratic Republic of Congo, which has one of the highest rates of new leprosy cases. Civil unrest, lack of medical care and other challenges have hidden many of these. It is a country torn apart and many people are suffering. Chris trains officers proficient in preventing disability; they will pass on their skills to healthcare workers, to teach patients self-care at local clinics. Many people resist wearing protective clothing like special sandals to prevent feet getting cuts and infections, because this immediately sets them apart, a symbol of leprosy which invites stigma. They don't feel pain, so they aren't prompted to take action.

Our work doesn't end with medical treatment and social support; we also try to reach out with God's love to heal the human spirit. Gifts towards this work will make a lifetime of difference to the sufferers of the disease."


I hope we can make a good contribution to this essential work.

#### SOUTH AFRICA EVENING:

# Sunday November 19th, 7.15 for 7.30pm

After a recent trip to South Africa, spent working with the Anglican Cathedral In Bloemfontein, **Liz Adekunle** (an ordinand from Ridley Hall whom many will remember from her time on placement with us last academic year) will talk about her experiences there.

This presentation will identify the needs of the local Christian community in Bloemfontein and further afield, 12 years on from Apartheid, and offer some reflections on them. It will also highlight some of the issues surrounding Christianity and African traditional beliefs, and Liz will talk about her work in the townships with particular reference to AIDS and HIV.

#### THE "TREE OF JESSE PAINTINGS" IN THE LADY CHAPEL

As a painter I mostly paint landscapes and environmental subjects, although as a connoisseur I am mostly, though not exclusively, interested in religious art. Although the Church still commissions art, the lack of a real "lingua franca" compared to say Gothic or Renaissance art can make the results look self-conscious, and personally I lack the confidence that anything I do in that genre will satisfy my own self-criticism. Perhaps these four variations on the theme of the Tree of Jesse west window, including the font below (and the suggestion of Fr Andrew presiding over a baptism) are the nearest I can get at present; the two outer canvases were drawn from life and the two inner are a subsequent development of the theme.

#### MAKENI ECUMENICAL CENTRE UPDATE

Last July Caroline Cope, staying in Zambia, met with Wenda Dil, widow of Fr Pierre Dil, who is now in charge of the Makeni Centre. She spoke of the Centre's current activities, and requested help with funding and support

The St Nicholas Aids Orphanage at Makeni provides full care, including food, clothing and schooling, for 36 children, and supports 70 children in nearby townships. All the children at the orphanage have lost both parents to AIDS and many are HIV positive. Children at the Centre are in the care of the House Mothers, providing a happy and settled atmosphere but it can be difficult once they start to move into the outside world. Much thought and consultation is being given to this.

There are several ways in which LSM might be able to give direct help to some of these children:

#### Sponsorship

Only two children at the orphanage have sponsors. It costs around £35 a month to sponsor a child, slightly more (£40) in the months when they have to buy new shoes or uniform. Mrs Dil promises she could facilitate regular communication between sponsor and child (letters, pictures etc).

The centre would also welcome help in supporting sixteen year old Audrey Kabwe (bright, capable and currently head girl of the Makeni primary school), to attend boarding school. The total cost of supporting Audrey for a year would be around £330, and even part sponsorship would be most welcome.

#### Volunteers

Other projects at the Makeni Centre, include agricultural resettlement work, training town-dwellers in long-forgotten farming skills and giving them land in "resettlement villages". They are seeking more volunteers. In particular, a Carpentry Teacher to train students to use new, sophisticated machinery. They also need Accountants and IT Specialists to help with day-to-day running of centre, and to help the House Mothers, particularly with reintegrating the orphanage children into the outside world, a Child Psychologist
