VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,
 'Swine Flu'

The problems arising for the churches as a result of the H1N1 virus, particularly over the administration of the chalice, have received a good deal of coverage over the past few weeks. On the Sunday following the publication of the Archbishops' recommendations on this (July 26th) I was away on holiday, and Fr Mark wisely decided to comply with those recommendations. Following this, several people expressed a variety of views, and so I decided to write some notes on the subject and to introduce a policy of intinction by the Celebrant. Some of you will have seen those notes, but I thought that it would be sensible to include them in this Newsletter, although I realise that the situation may change rapidly, particularly when schools and colleges begin a new term.

The key principle is that, though we cannot now prevent the onset of H1N1, we can still slow its advance and mitigate its effects. The more we slow its advance the more chance there is of the virus attenuating and the less chance there is of its mutating into something more serious. The Chief Medical Officer has warned against the 'seriously flawed thinking' that the virus should be allowed to spread unabated, since we know insufficient details about the risk profile. There is not currently agreement as to how the virus spreads, or may do so in the future.

The recommendation of the Archbishops of Canterbury and York, issued on the Feast of St Mary Magdalene (July 22nd) is that the use of the 'common cup' at Holy Communion should be suspended. This recommendation is supported by the Bishops in our own Diocese, although it is clear that any decision must be taken 'locally' (i.e. by individual clergy and parishes); this is why I have invited comments from members of the congregation here.

The issue has aroused strong feelings. One person said that 'the recommendation is nonsense'. Many people feel that there are myriad other and more likely ways of passing on the infection (including standing close to one another whether on church premises or elsewhere). Some people clearly have a theological difficulty with not receiving in both kinds (although the Church's teaching is clear, that while it is desirable to receive in both kinds, the fullness of the Sacrament is nevertheless received in one kind), but I suspect that this may have less to do with theology than with not wanting to be 'rushed'

at the communion rail. Suggestions have been made about alternative procedures, for example, having a 'station' elsewhere in the church, or for communicants simply to indicate that they do not wish to receive the chalice. On the other hand, many people feel that the simplest and least confusing course is to follow the recommendations, and receive in one kind. There is some sense in acting in concert with others on such a matter, and an advantage in a church being seen to have a concern for 'neighbour' (see 1 Corinthians 8); that at least is a view to be honoured over against the argument that the church should not be so bothered about regulations on purity! However, a procedure which some churches in this diocese are following is this: that the celebrant who is administering communion carries a chalice, and is accompanied by an assistant carrying the ciborium containing the wafers. The celebrant, who will have used one of the antibacterial gels, intincts the edge of each wafer, without his fingers touching the wine, before putting it in the hands of the communicant. The fact that this is done immediately before the communicant receives should obviate the possibility of liquid remaining on the communicant's hand. This procedure I shall follow in LSM at Sung and High Mass over the next few weeks, before assessing how we feel about it. There may be some communicants who do not wish to receive in this manner; I think that it should be possible for them to indicate this discreetly before a wafer is intincted, so that they then receive in one kind only.

It is difficult in the current confusing situation to know what we should be doing for the best; but I hope that everyone at LSM will respect the decision which I have made. The most important thing is that we come faithfully to receive the Sacrament, and that we are built up in love and charity with one another and with our neighbour.

Parish Centre Development: during August I also produced a few notes on where we are with the proposed Parish Centre Development and fundraising for it. I hope that you have found a copy in the church. The intention is that 'updates' will be produced every few weeks, with the notes also being posted on our website. For September...

New Lay Pastoral Assistant...and a new Assistant Organist

Chris Pickles' successor is from even further north. **Kyle McNeil** comes from Auchterarder in Scotland, and has spent the last three years at Durham University. He is hoping to move in to 57 George Nuttall Close on September 7th, and his first Sunday with us will be September 13th. I'm sure that you will give him a warm welcome! As I write, I'm having difficulty in tracking him down (Auchterarder is a long way off!), but I'm hoping that he may write a short piece about himself to be included in this newsletter. Joe Fort's replacement as Assistant Organist and Choir Director is his brother **Anthony** who is coming up to Girton College; he will be with us from October 1st. Like his older brother, Anthony has spent a year as Organ Scholar at All Saints' Margaret Street.

Feast Days, 'Back to Church' and Harvest

September contains a good selection of festivals; there is the **Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary** on Tuesday 8th, and then the **Triumph of the Cross** on Monday 14th. For the time being we are keeping to the pattern of having an evening Sung Mass on the 14th, but not on the 8th, partly because we do keep several other Marian feasts with 'full honours' during the year! Monday 21st is the **Feast of St Matthew** (and the anniversary of my ordination to the diaconate in 1969...also the eve of the Diocesan Clergy Conference in France!) At the end of the month we shall have a High Mass on the wonderful feast of **St Michael and All Angels**, Tuesday 29th. Two days before Michaelmas, along with many other churches, we're making Sunday 27th '**Back to Church Sunday**'. Rob Francis has designed an excellent postcard for us to drop through the letterboxes of houses in the parish; but the other way of making something of this Sunday is for YOU to think whether there's someone whom you could bring 'Back to Church' that day...and then for us all to be on the alert with our welcomes should there be responses to cards or invitations on that day. Our **Harvest Thanksgiving** will be on Sunday 4th October. We shall be giving appropriate Harvest offerings to Jimmy's Night Shelter this year; further information from Penny Robson elsewhere in this newsletter. Tickets for our **Harvest Supper** the same evening will be available from September 20th; profit will go to the Sunday School building at St Cyprian's, Sharpeville,. With us for that day will be **Rig David**, from the Calcutta Cathedral Relief Service; visa problems prevented him making the CRS day earlier this year.

Children and Young people at LSM: the Finance and Standing Committee are proposing to the PCC (which meets on September 16th) that our Mission Statement objectives for the coming year include one on our work with children and young people: to formulate an agreed statement of our vision for work with children, young people and students, and to communicate it effectively within our community. I imagine that if the PCC agrees to this, a small working party would begin to work on this, and thoughts and ideas from anyone would be welcome. The Children's Group leaders and helpers (including some new recruits) are meeting at 5.30pm on Friday 11th September, the same day that Junior Choir Practice resumes.

We have exciting times ahead of us; let's be faithful in our personal prayers and in gathering together for our corporate prayer and worship!

LSM AUTUMN TRIP

If you think the way to understand a person is to see where they grew up, the LSM Autumn trip will enlighten you about Fr Andrew. We are visiting his native stamping ground of Highgate and Hampstead. We will leave LSM promptly at 9.15am. Keats' House has just reopened after refurbishment. John Keats lived in Hampstead in the then semi-detached house from 1818 to 1820, falling in love with the girl next door, Fanny Brawne, but also catching tuberculosis that led to his death, in Rome, in 1821. We'll have a guided tour of the house at 11.00am, and then move on to Kenwood House on Hampstead Heath.

This early 18th-century house was much enlarged by Robert Adam in the 1760s and then further in the 1790s. Both Zucchi and Angelica Kauffmann were employed to provide paintings, and Zucchi fell in love with Kauffmann here. Their paintings are overshadowed now by the Iveagh Bequest collection, which includes works by Hals, Rembrandt and Vermeer and by Reynolds and Gainsborough. Kenwood House has a café where lunch can be taken, and also some fine gardens. You have the choice of strolling across Hampstead Heath to Highgate Cemetery or taking the coach for the short ride.

We will visit the East cemetery at Highgate (which is where the monument to Marx is to be found); access to the West Cemetery is only possible as part of a guided party and no pre-booking is possible. A tour leaves at 3pm. which we hope some people may be able to join.

We expect to end the day with a visit to the church in which Fr Andrew grew up, St Augustine's, Archway Road, before returning to LSM by around 7.00pm. Only 29 places are available on this trip, so sign up quickly if you would like to go: there is a list at the back of the church, or email Robin Osborne on ro225@cam.ac.uk
