From Fr Mark Bishop

Dear Friends,

When I was told that this letter had to be sufficient for the bumper edition of the newsletter to cover both July and August, I was immediately reminded of the bumper holiday editions of comics that were given to me to read in the back seat of the car by my parents as we drove off on our summer holidays. I spent many happy hours sitting in the back, reading about the exploits of Dennis the Menace and Roy of the Rovers, blissfully unaware of the miles that were being covered as we travelled. I am not sure how many parents in this congregation will be giving a copy of the bumper July/August edition of this newsletter to their children in the back of the car to keep them quiet on their summer holidays, but I hope that you will all read these pages with as much eagerness as I did the summer bumper editions of Hotspur and Eagle!

This time of the year has a sense of holiday expectation about it. Exams are now finished and the results are awaited. Plans are being made for the summer and the coming year. Many people are looking forward in eagerness to what lies ahead. There is also perhaps a sense of anticlimax around, particularly for those leaving Cambridge after long periods of study about to start on the process of looking for a job. There have been one or two uncertain farewells at the end of the Parish Mass recently as people walk off down the path to Trumpington Street knowing that a chapter in their lives has come to an end, and they are not quite sure what lies ahead. I remember that feeling too and even wondering to the then Vicar of LSM, James Owen, whether I would ever come back to Cambridge!

Whether it is because we are all so linked to the life of the University in the broadest sense, or whether the academic year cycle was so drilled into us from an early age, but I think we all get to this time of the year with a feeling that something is completed and yet something is yet to start. It is a strange combination of achievement, and expectation.

I think we can rightly allow ourselves some sense of achievement each time we walk into the Parish Centre: it is a marvellous space with its soft apsidal curves and lightness which seems to speak of more than just being a bigger room. It has a sense of potential and expectation about it. I know that Ian Douglas and his group are working on what can be achieved from this new space, and I hope that we will all continue to think hard and pray

about new opportunities that will start to present themselves to us over the coming weeks. Someone has suggested some Taizé worship in there; others have wondered about developing a drop-in centre. There is a lot to think and pray about. Our commissioning as a congregation by Bishop Stephen on 5th June

‘to live, work and pray as one body in Christ, to trust each other as fellow workers in thy Church, and to give ourselves with body, mind and spirit to the ministries to which we have been called’ was an important moment, I think, in the life of our fellowship, and we should all be as open as we can be to the opportunities for new service that may be opening up around us, as the life of the Kingdom grows.

Part of that life includes the LSM summer festival. By the time you read this the Gift Day will be upon us, and the production of Pilgrim’s Progress will be about to be performed on Friday 8th and Saturday 9th July under the expert direction of Lucy McKitterick. I hope that you will all be able to support this important moment in the life of LSM and attend a performance and the Festival Day itself.

Other parts of that life include the ministry of visiting that is quietly undertaken so that people who are unable to get to church as easily as before maintain a link through a regular visit. I think this attentiveness to each other speaks well of our community, and I thank those who engage in it. And on that note: people for your prayers should include please Joan Waton who remains at present at Addenbrooke’s. We were delighted to see her at the Dedication Mass for the Parish Centre on 5th June having made special arrangements with her doctors to have leave of absence to be with us! Her enthusiasm and positiveness is an inspiration, notwithstanding the medical setbacks recently. It is also good to see Laurence Fletcher and Donald Clough with us on Sundays brought by Laurence’s daughter Jane. Please pray for these devout men and their families. It was also good to see Patricia Barnard with us for Pentecost and the Friends’ lunch. Please pray for her in her new pattern of life in a nursing home.

I would also ask you to continue to keep the process of selecting a new parish priest in your prayers, praying for both a sense of call in the candidate and a sense of discernment in those undertaking the selection. On Monday 15th August we celebrate the Festival of the Assumption of

the Blessed Virgin Mary and we welcome our old friend Brother Martin SSF as our preacher. Amidst everything that is happening here, it will be good to be recalled to the quiet example of Mary, someone very young, quite powerless and ordinary, who was asked to be no less than the bearer of God, and who was able to respond with a 'yes', not knowing what the future would hold for her, or what any of it may mean: 'Let it be to me according to your word'. So may it be for us, too.

I hope that you all have a good summer: it is a great privilege to be able to be involved with this remarkable community of LSM.

The search for a new Vicar

You will no doubt be wondering what is happening about getting LSM a new Vicar. Well, the answer is that things are moving forward, if slowly. And now is the moment when we need your help.

In the middle of May the PCC had the meeting that it is required to have (the so-called 'Section 11 Meeting') to choose representatives to take part in the selection process, to finalise the Parish Profile and to decide whether to pass any of the resolutions relating to the ministry of ordained women.

On the question of Parish Representatives, the PCC decided, on the proposal of Christine Tipple, that these should be Paul Huskinson and me. The bulk of the work on the Parish Profile had been done – over many weeks and with much discussion – by a working group of the PCC and the PCC was very

pleased with the result, making only a small number of generally trivial changes. With regard to the possibility of passing one or more of the resolutions, too, the PCC had done much thinking, with a long discussion before Fr. Andrew left. All this meant that the Section 11 meeting was able to reflect not simply on the principles involved in the resolutions, but on what passing a resolution formally limiting the role of ordained women would mean in the context of LSM. Recognising that one of the things that has been wonderful about LSM has been the way in which individuals with very different views about the ministry of ordained women have been able to work and worship together, and that the passing of any resolution would change the *status quo*, the PCC agreed not to pass any resolutions on the matter. The Parish Profile makes clear to anyone interested in becoming Vicar – and to the Bishop and our Patrons – that the people of LSM have conflicting strongly-held views about the ministry of ordained women and that an incoming incumbent will have to deal sensitively with this issue.

Where we now need your help is in recruiting an appropriately sensitive new incumbent. The PCC decided that, just as was the case when Fr. Andrew was appointed, it would be better to set about finding a new Vicar than to wait for a new Vicar to find us. We therefore plan to make contact with priests who might potentially be interested, sending them the Parish Profile and encouraging them to make their interest known to the Patron. You are all therefore encouraged both to alert the Finance and Standing Committee (through me – ro225@cam.ac.uk – or through Paul Huskinson churchwardenlsm@gmail.com) to any priests you think should be approached, and to ask any senior clergy you know and who know LSM and might advise us to let you have potential names to pass on.

We would be grateful if you would do this as soon as possible, letting us have names by 20th July. Although the timetable for appointment is not yet fixed, we are hopeful that interviews may happen in late September. The timetable will be one of the things that the PCC discusses with the Bishop and the Patron at the so-called ‘Section 12’ meeting on 18th July, for which your prayers are asked.

SUNG MASSES:

A distinctive part of our life and ministry at Little St Mary's is the faithful observance of the holy days of the Christian year with a Sung Mass (or sometimes High Mass), at 7.00pm on weekdays and at 10.00am on Saturdays or bank holidays. Sung Mass usually lasts one hour. It would be very good indeed to see more members of the Sunday congregations building attendance at Sung Mass on weekday Festivals into their own pattern of life, binding us closer in the worship of the Church – "*seven whole days, not one in seven*". Our servers, musicians and visiting clergy work hard to enable this offering of worship to continue and it would be very encouraging for them, too, to see more people. Weekday Festivals have a wonderful way of interrupting the week and reminding us of God's love for us and the great richness and variety of the faith to which we are called. PILGRIMAGE TO WALSINGHAM:



Stephen, Bishop of Ely:

“The pattern of hope and grace already foreshadowed in Mary will be fulfilled in the new creation in Christ when all the redeemed will participate in the full glory of the Lord (cf. 2 Corinthians 3.18). Christian experience of communion with God in this present life is a sign and foretaste of divine grace and glory, a hope shared with the whole of creation (Romans 8.18-23). The individual believer and the Church find their consummation in the New Jerusalem, the holy bride of Christ (cf. Revelation 21.2, Ephesians 5.27). When Christians from East and West through the generations have pondered God’s work in Mary, they have discerned in faith that it is fitting that the Lord gathered her wholly to Himself: in Christ, she is already a new creation in whom ‘the old has passed away and the new has come’ (2 Corinthians 5.17). Viewed from such an eschatological perspective, Mary can be seen both as a type of the Church, and as a disciple with a special place in the economy of salvation.”

Some Summer Saints

19th July: St Gregory of Nyssa

Born at Caesarea in what is now Turkey, around the year 330, Gregory became the most original of the theologians known as the Cappadocian Fathers (Gregory, his brother Basil and Gregory Nazianzen), who advanced the development of Christian theology, including the doctrine of the Trinity. Introduced to the spiritual life by his sister Macrina, Gregory at first refused ordination and chose instead to pursue a secular career. Yet he was ordained later in life, and in 372 was chosen to be bishop of Nyssa. Seven years later, both his brother Basil and his sister Macrina died, and from this darkness emerged a profound spirituality. His influence on the theology of the Church has been considerable.

1st August: St Peter's Chains

Acts 12.1-19 tells of the imprisonment of Peter by Herod, and records the prayers of the Church on his behalf. The feast of St Peter in Chains (St Peter ad Vincula) commemorates the visit of the angel of the Lord to his prison, when *"his chains fell off from his hands"*. This feast is also Lammas Day – the festival of the wheat harvest, and the first harvest festival of the year. On this day it was customary to bring to church a loaf made from the new crop. The name comes from the Old English word *hlafmaesse*, meaning 'loaf-mass', but antiquarians have occasionally misunderstood the word and thought it meant 'lamb-mass', resulting in the sort of activity recorded by John Brand in 1849: *"On that day, the tenants who held lands of the cathedral church at York, which is dedicated to St Peter ad Vincula, were bound by their tenure to bring a live lamb into the church at High Mass"*.
