

From the Vicar

Commemoration of Lanfranc, bishop & abbot, 2016

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

'We have done with dogma and divinity, Easter and Whitsun past, The long, long Sundays after Trinity, Are with us at last; The passionless Sundays after Trinity, Neither feast-day nor fast.'

So wrote the poet John MeadeFalkner, the rest of whose poem you can find elsewhere in this newsletter. It's more of a late summer poem but I couldn't resist it for now. I love his poem because it reminds me of the yearly cycle of the church's life. This cycle is not endless repetition but rather a circling down ever deeper into the life of God as we go through our lives.

I do, however, want to take slight issue with this first verse. He's right that the Sundays after Trinity are lengthy as they take us from the end of May until November in 2016; he's also right that, apart from the pattern of feast days that pepper the year, there is neither feast nor fast on these Sundays in green. We are, however, far from done with dogma, divinity and passion: the colour of these Sundays in church is green exactly because this is a season of growth in our faith. Gardeners among you will know that you can't endlessly feed and water plants but have to give them space to grow; fitness fans will know that muscles need time to grow between gym sessions otherwise one's efforts will be in vain. Equally, after the astonishing nourishment we have received in Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Holy Week, Easter, Ascension and Pentecost, we now need time to let it all bed down and take proper root. The dogma, divinity and passion are all there, however, for the are what make the growth possible, albeit we are now allowing our faith som space to expand and deepen.

In the era of 24-hour news, there is constant pressure on everyone to offer excitement and novelty. Politicians are expected to respond instantly t questions and issues and then get roasted alive when those responses are revealed to be unconsidered – unsurprising given that they weren't allowed time to consider them! Equally, the large increase in children suffering from ADHD (attention deficit hyperactivity disorder) can't be unconnected with

the ceaseless barrage of data and attention-grabbing excitement that comes through television, video games and the internet and smartphones.

The long Sundays after Trinity, therefore, stand in contrast and opposition to this. They remind us that all growth happens in silence and often imperceptibly. They also remind us that growth takes time and cannot be magicked or microwaved here; further that we need space and an absence of stimulus for our hearts and minds to calm and find their even temperament. It is only when you stop splashing and swirling the water that the water clears and you can see into the depths. This is exactly the same with the soul. So I commend to you these Sundays after Trinity. They are a glorious opportunity gently to grow in our faith. Even more I commend to you this summer and any opportunity you can snatch for rest and holiday. Do make sure sharing in the Eucharist Sunday by Sunday remains your discipline (exploring churches abroad or in Cornwall or Wales or wherever is fun as well as a matter of faithfulness on our part). You'll be amazed where you can find silence and peace if you look. I remember a businessman I prepared for Confirmation in my last parish who used to go and sit on the loo in his firm to get regular five minute blocks of time to pray where he wouldn't be disturbed! Few of us need to go to those extremes but it's a reminder that it's never impossible.

You may, of course, find silence and space painful or frightening. Old anxieties can resurface, depression emerge or former enmities be recalled. Don't be afraid of this. They are coming to the surface because the Holy Spirit wants you to offer them to him and find healing from them. Keep faithful to periods of silence and keep offering to God whatever emerges from them. Don't get stuck on a particular anxiety or obsession that might come up but return gently to your prayer word and let God do his slow and patient work.

Be assured of my regular prayers for you and do please pray for me that my words may be matched (at least occasionally) by my actions.

Ordinations

One of the great privileges of being part of the L.S.M. community is that we are given a part in the formation of many people for the sacred ministry of the church. Not only have we listed below people who are well-known to the parish there are some whom you may not know but who have been touched and strengthened by worshipping occasionally with us while training for the Diaconate and Priesthood. Do keep all these people in your prayers:

The Vicar had the pleasure of being present at (and assisting in the laying on of hands) the ordination to the Priesthood of the Rev'd Nicol Kinrade on Saturday 21st May at Chichester Cathedral. Mother Nicol offered Mass for the first time on Sunday 22nd May at 9.45am at S. Margaret, Ditchling, where she continues to serve as Assistant Curate.

The Rev'd Richard Stanton to be ordained Priest at 11am on Saturday 2nd July in Norwich Cathedral. Fr Richard will offer Mass for the first time on Tuesday 5th July at 7.30pm at the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Attleborough, Norfolk, where he continues to serve as Assistant Curate. Fr Andrew Greany, former Vicar of L.S.M., will preach at the first Mass.

The Rev'd Robert Kozak to be ordained Priest at 4pm on Saturday 2nd July in St Albans Cathedral. Fr Robert will offer Mass for the first time on Sunday 3rd July at 10am at All Saints', Leavesden, where he continues to serve as Assistant Curate.

Robert Coupland to be made Deacon at 3pm on Saturday 25th June in Chichester Cathedral. He will serve as Assistant Curate of S. Michael & All Angels and S. Paul's, Brighton.

Alexander Shannon to be made Deacon at 10.30am on Sunday 3rd July at Ely Cathedral. He will serve as Assistant Curate of All Saints', St Ives. The Vicar will be preaching at the parish Mass in the evening after his ordination.

Pray also for Max Drinkwater (S. Mary's, Newmarket, 26th June), Daniel Trott (S. John's, Upper Norwood, 25th June) and Gareth Davies (Mortlake with East Sheen Team Ministry, 25th June) to be made Deacon. All of whom have worshipped with us episodically.

About the cover image

The image on the front cover is of the statue of S. Etheldreda, Abbess, and Patron of the Diocese of Ely, which can be found in Ely Cathedral.

Etheldreda (d.679) was the daughter of Anna, king of East Anglia, and probably born at Exning near Newmarket. At an early age she was married, but she remained a virgin. On his death, she retired to the Isle of Ely, her dowry. In 660, for political reasons, she was married to the young king of Northumbria who was then only 15 years old, and several years younger than her. He agreed that she should remain a virgin, as in her previous marriage, but 12 years later he changed his mind. Etheldreda, advised and aided by Wilfred, bishop of Northumbria, refused. Egfrith offered bribes in vain and she then left him and became a nun at Coldingham and founded a double monastery at Ely in 673. Etheldreda restored an old church at Ely and built her monastery on the site of what is now Ely Cathedral. The monastery flourished for 200 years until it was destroyed by the Danes. It was refounded as a Benedictine community in 970.

Etheldreda died c.680 from a tumour on the neck, reputedly as a divine punishment for her vanity in wearing necklaces in her younger days; in reality it was the result of the plague which also killed several of her nuns, many of whom were her sisters or nieces. 17 years after her death her body was found to be incorrupt: Wilfred and her physician Cynefrid were among the witnesses. The tumour on her neck, cut by her doctor, was found to be healed. The linen cloths in which her body was wrapped were as fresh as the day she had been buried. Her body was placed in a stone sarcophagus of Roman origin, found at Grantchester, and reburied. Her shrine became a major pilgrimage destination until it was destroyed at the Reformation in 1541.

The only remaining relic of S. Etheldreda, her left hand, was found preserved in a separate reliquary, hidden in a priest's hiding hole in a house in Sussex in about 1811. The hand was found on an engraved silver plate on which was written *Manus Sanctae Etheldredae DCLXXIII*. The plate itself was of a tenth-century style, suggesting that the hand had been separated from the rest of S. Etheldreda's body at around that time. It is kept as a focus for prayer and veneration in the Roman Catholic Church of S. Etheldreda in Ely.

Knitting Squares and Baby Clothes.



There they saw so many young women were suffering from injuries which occurred during difficult labour with no skilled medical help. These injuries destroyed their happiness for the rest of their lives.

It is something that can be prevented and cured with the right knowledge and surgery. These two doctors dedicated their lives to providing both. LSM cannot support financially any more overseas projects but perhaps some knitting could be done?

Squares 6" knitted number 8 (4mm) needles in double knitting washable yarn to make blankets for the mothers as they leave the hospitals to go home or clothes for the babies. Sometimes these are the only possessions they have. Please contact cstipple@gmail.com for more information.
