Dear Friends,

With our farewells and heartfelt thanks duly offered to **Christian Rutherford** on Sunday June 20<sup>th</sup>, when we also celebrated the 10<sup>th</sup> Birthday of the Junior Choir which he founded, we now look forward to the official arrival of **Simon Jackson** as his successor. We also said good-bye and thank you that day to **Anthony Fort**, Assistant Organist during the last academic year, and to four members of the Junior Choir: **Lizzie Davies**, joining the Parish Choir, and to **Emily Rutherford, Naomi Carne** and **Emily Shercliffe**, who are moving on to Higher Education. Simon's tenure of the post of Director of Music begins on July 1<sup>st</sup>, and so he will be plunged in almost immediately 'at the deep end' with this year's **Patronal Festival**, Friday July 2<sup>nd</sup>, the Feast of the Visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary. The preacher at the 7pm High Mass will be **the Revd Dr Cally Hammond**, Dean of Caius. After the service there will be a Buffet (Bring-and-Share) Supper. Please 'bring' if you can, and help to make this a really joyful celebration of 'Our Lady of Grace', as we join her in magnifying the Lord and praying for our life together at LSM.

Another SUMMER FETE and GIFT DAY is almost upon us. The curtain goes up on the first performance of *Danielis Ludus: the Jazz Version* at 7.30pm on **Friday July 9<sup>th</sup>**. Tickets are just £5. Lucy McKitterick and her assistants and advisers have put a huge amount of work into this; don't miss it! The following morning, we begin with Low Mass at 8am, by no means the least important event on that or any other day of the week at LSM. From 8.30am, help with putting up gazebos and arranging stalls will be most welcome. As I have already mentioned in the notices at church, there are a number of items which would be most welcome for stocking up the stalls...CAKES and PRESERVES, BOTTLES for the Tombola, and TREASURES OLD AND NEW for Deirdre Price-Thomas' stall (the only one from which profit will be going to the Parish Centre Development Fund... everything else, as usual, to the General Fund, with 5% being given to the Mission projects which we support). Here is the Saturday programme:

There will be Art Exhibitions in the Lady Chapel, a Children's face painting station outside, and an opportunity to buy tickets for the GRAND RAFFLE (for the Parish Centre fund). Do please come along to support this exciting day, and make sure you enjoy a Parish Room Lunch!

Yes, the Parish Room will still be open and available to us on the day of the Summer Fete. However, it is possible that there will have been some important developments in the week leading up to that Saturday. All being well, the first task of moving six headstones from the site of the extension to their new position on the north side of the Church may be accomplished on July 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup>. Next, I hope on July 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup>, there will be a final soil analysis to determine what sort of foundations are to be used. Should it be possible to proceed using shallow foundations, there may be a slight reduction in the tender price from our favoured contractor, York Construction, a firm which has done a good deal of work for Colleges in central Cambridge. So, there are still some queries to be answered, but it MAY be that the main work is under way before the end of July. Please continue to pray for the furthering of this project, not least the fundraising which we still need to do...and for guidance as we begin to think more concretely about imaginative ways of using the Centre when it is complete.

After the Patronal Festival on July 2<sup>nd</sup>, we have two further major Saints Days in July, St Mary Magdalene on Thursday 22<sup>nd</sup>, and St James the Great, which falls on a Sunday (25<sup>th</sup>) this year. I'm delighted that the Bishop of Port Moresby in Papua New Guinea, Peter Ramsden, will be with us to preach on St James Day at 10.30am; he will join us for lunch afterwards and show one of his son Stephen's films about his Diocese. I remember that Bishop Peter, when a Parish Priest in PNG some years ago, began a sermon at All Saints Hesse (my last parish) by demonstrating the way in which visitors are greeted by the thrust of a spear in some PNG villages; perhaps he will be more restrained now that he's a bishop!

Another overseas visitor this year, not specifically to LSM, but to Ely Diocese, will be a priest from the linked Diocese of Vellore, in South India. Noble Gembeeram will be spending 3 months in the Diocese during the autumn. Much of his work in Vellore has been focused on the restoration and improvement of the diocesan hospital; this has included setting up outreach clinics in villages, and offering support to families affected by HIV/AIDS. Perhaps 'LSM Global' will be considering an invitation to him.

England. Lay representatives are elected by the lay members of the Deanery Synod, which means that not very many lay members have a vote! However, your interest and your prayers are important, and you might like to talk to our Deanery Synod representatives (Richard Morgan, Sue Munro and Jo Wibberley, elected representatives, and Sheila Bennett, Shirley Dex and Peter Harland, *ex officio* representatives) about your concerns. The closing date for nominations is Friday 3 September, and the result will be known in mid-October. Pray too for members of the current General Synod at their meeting over the weekend of 10/11 July; the issue of the Ordination of Women to the Episcopate and provision for those who are opposed to this is high on the agenda.

### **PARISH AND SOCIETY OF MARY PILGRIMAGE TO WALSINGHAM, 19th June 2010**

On a damp and breezy excuse for a June Saturday, twenty four pilgrims from Little St Mary's Church and the Society of Mary met at the Shrine of Our Lady at Walsingham. The terracotta roof of the shrine church was washed a deep red by the rain. Once inside, we gathered around the Annunciation Altar, repeating the antiphon, "Blessed are those whose hearts are set on the pilgrim's way," between verses of Psalm 84. Entering the Holy House, built as a standing memory of Our Lady's own house at Nazareth, and lit mostly by votive candles, we prayed, in

Particular, for our parish, those to be ordained, the shrine, and ministry to the sick.

After Mass in honour of Our Lady of Walsingham and lunch (picnickers relocating ourselves indoors), Fr Stephen Gallagher told the story of the founding and re-founding of the shrine, recalling especially how the underground spring, which had formed the original holy well before the Reformation, had welled up where work was being done on the new site. Even so, he explained, the grace of God wells up inexhaustibly for us, to mark which he encouraged us to drink deep gulps of the water: each pilgrim receives some to drink, is marked on the forehead with the sign of the cross, and spills some through their fingers.

Although the weather did not look encouraging, Br Paschal, of the Society of S. Francis, explained that an important part of the devotion of the Stations of the Cross is the physical movement between stations, so we followed him outside to meditate on Our Lord's road to Calvary. Br Paschal explained the Franciscan origin of the practice, and led us in praying for those today whose sufferings and needs reflect those of Our Lord and those with him.

The pilgrimage ended with Benediction, and prayers for the last visit to the Holy House. In the final hymn, we sang that we would stay there forever, were it not that Jesus calls us back. Hence there was nothing for it but to go home, taking a little of Walsingham with us.

#### **ST BRIDGET OF SWEDEN**

The most celebrated saint of Sweden was the daughter of Birger Persson of the family of Finsta, governor and lawspeaker of Uppland, and one of the richest landowners of the country, and his wife, a member of the so-called Lawspeaker branch of the Folkunga family. Through her mother, young Birgitta was a relation of the Swedish kings of her lifetime.

In 1316, when she was 13 she married Ulf Gudmarsson of the family of Ulvåsa, lord of Närke, to whom she bore eight children, four daughters and four sons. All of them survived infancy, which was very rare at that time. One of whom was afterwards honoured as St. Catherine of Sweden. Birgitta's saintly and charitable life soon made her known far and wide; she gained, too, great religious influence over her husband, with whom (1341-1343) she went on pilgrimage to Santiago de Compostela.

In 1344, shortly after their return, Ulf died in the Cistercian monastery of Alvastra Abbey in Östergötland, and Birgitta then devoted herself wholly to religion.

It was about this time that she founded the Order of the Holy Saviour, or the Brigittines, of which the principal house at Vadstena was richly endowed by King Magnus Eriksson of Sweden and his Queen.

About 1350 she went to Rome, partly to obtain from the Pope the authorisation of the new order and partly in pursuance of her self-imposed mission to elevate the moral tone of the age. It was not until 1370 that Pope Urban V confirmed the rule of her order, but meanwhile Birgitta had made herself universally beloved in Rome by her kindness and good works. Save for occasional pilgrimages, including one to Jerusalem in 1373, she remained in Rome until her death on 23 July 1373. She was originally buried at San Lorenzo in Panisperna before being moved to Sweden. She was canonised in the year 1391 by Pope Boniface IX, and confirmed by the Council of Constance in 1415. Because of new discussions about her works, the Council of Basel confirmed the orthodoxy of the revelations in 1436.

Her visions of the Nativity of Jesus had a great influence on depictions of the Nativity of Jesus in art. Shortly before her death, she described a vision which included the infant Jesus as lying on the ground, and emitting light Himself, and describes the Virgin as blonde-haired; many depictions followed this and reduced other light sources in the scene to emphasise this effect, and the Nativity remained very commonly treated with chiaroscuro through to the Baroque. Other details often seen such as a single candle "attached to the wall," and the presence of God the Father above, also come from Bridget's vision.

### **CAMFED: Friday lunch charity for July and August**



In 1991, Ann Cotton visited Zimbabwe to investigate why girls' school enrolment in rural areas was so low. What she found surprised her. Contrary to the common assumption that families weren't sending girls to school for cultural reasons, Ann discovered poverty was the main roadblock. Families couldn't afford to buy books or pay school fees for all their children, so they had to choose who would receive an education. Girls were rarely chosen. The reason was simple: boys had a better chance of getting a paid job after graduation.

Ann returned home to Cambridge determined to find a way to help girls go to school in Zimbabwe. She recruited friends and family and sold baked goods to raise money and awareness about the lack of education for girls in Africa. At the end of her campaign, she supported 32 girls through school.

In 1993, she formally launched Camfed, the Campaign for Female Education. The girls supported by Camfed stayed in school and did well, demonstrating that girls' education was valued by families when costs were met.

Camfed fights poverty and HIV/AIDS in Africa by educating girls and empowering women to become leaders of change. Their goal is to improve the lives of two million children by 2013.
